12th edition of World Snow Day completed.

<u>Oberhofen, 16th January 2023 –</u> On the 15th January, 126 in 41 countries took part in the 12th edition of World Snow Day.

- Free lift passes and equipment rental at Skistar resorts Sälen (SWE), Åre (SWE), Vemdalen (SWE), Trysil (NOR) and Hemsedal (NOR),
- Free ski lessons in Peyongchang (KOR)
